<b>Against Abuse, Inc.</b>	Pinal County	Providing a GED and employment skills library and mentoring component to victims of domestic violence.	\$26,810
<b>Amity Foundation, Circle Tree Ranch</b>	Pima County	Enhancing services to domestic violence victims with substance abuse issues.	\$35,350
<b>Chrysalis Shelter</b>	Maricopa County	Improving the Children's Outpatient Counseling Program.	\$32,728
<b>La Frontera</b>	Pima County	Expansion of services through Family Passages project to Vietnamese families and increase staff capacity to address domestic violence.	\$65,000
<b>Maricopa Association of Governments</b>	Maricopa County	Provision of a domestic violence planner to implement training to medical professionals to conduct domestic violence screening.	\$34,195
<b>New Life Center</b>	Maricopa County	Provision of a Child Trauma Specialist to enhance shelter services for children.	\$26,279
<b>Pima County Attorney's Office</b>	Pima County	Training all Pima County Victim Witness staff and volunteers to provide age-appropriate crisis response intervention activities for children at the scene of a domestic violence incident where law enforcement is called; intensify at-the-scene crisis intervention to include safety planning and domestic violence resource lists to decrease risk-factors; and offer public health nursing services to a percentage of families in the two Brewster Center shelters in Pima County.	\$62,755
<b>Sojourner Center</b>	Maricopa County	Provision of relapse prevention and support for women who are victims of domestic violence with co-occurring substance abuse. Services will be expanded to off-site transitional program.	\$66,154
<b>Southeastern Arizona Behavioral Health Services, Inc.</b>	Greenlee and Santa Cruz County	Implementation of the research and curriculum-based program Segundo Paso, which will be augmented to address relationship violence in partnership with Boys & Girls Clubs of Santa Cruz County, schools within the Santa Cruz Unified School District, Clifton High School, Duncan High School, Greenlee County Alternative School, 4-H, and Greenlee County Juvenile Probation. Also to increase community capacity and infrastructure through the Santa Cruz County Coordinated Response Team.	\$74,718
<b>Time Out, Inc.</b>	Gila County	Provision of education and intervention services to children who have witnessed or experienced domestic violence in their home. Also the shelter will enhance their services by providing education and counseling services to victims of domestic violence and their children, focusing on those who are suffering from post traumatic stress disorder.	\$30,312
